## Dr. Robert J. Glass: 2017 Michigan Superintendent of the Year

"I am thankful for the support of our community, the dedication of our staff, and the achievements of our students," says Glass.

The Michigan Association of School Administrators (MASA) has named Bloomfield Hills Schools Superintendent, Dr. Rob Glass, the 2017 Michigan Superintendent of the Year. The award is presented to a member who has shown tremendous effort and dedication to enriching the lives of children and the community as a whole.

Glass was surprised with the award in a ceremony at Bloomfield Hills High School. Students created posters, performed the fight song, and prepared a congratulatory video. "I am greatly honored by this award," says Glass. "It is our role to help students seek opportunities, form strong and caring relationships, take risks, be passionate and motivated, participate in meaningful work, and strive for excellence." He also expressed his gratitude to BHS faculty and staff. "Thank you for investing your heart and soul!" he says. "Both the growth you have facilitated and the relationships you have forged with our young people have made a huge difference in their lives. Our district is a special place because of you."

Glass joined Bloomfield Hills Schools on July 1, 2010, following nearly two years as superintendent in Dexter Community Schools. Before that, he was Executive Director of Instruction for Birmingham Public Schools and Principal at Quarton School in Birmingham. He was an elementary principal in Suttons Bay and Vestaburg Community Schools, as well as an elementary teacher in Hale, all located in Michigan. Earlier in his career, he was Director of Operations on a fellowship in India where he managed orphanages, vocational schools, and health services for children, the elderly, and the impoverished.

Dr. Glass completed his PhD program in Educational Leadership at Oakland University in 2014. During this time, he received the 2008 AASA Worth McClure Educational Administration Scholarship, awarded nationally to six outstanding graduate students in school administration. He holds a Master's in Educational Administration from Central Michigan University, a Master's in Teaching from Wayne State University, and a B.A. in Telecommunication from Michigan State University.



## New Art at Bloomfield Township Public Library

Conant Elementary students unveiled a new art piece at the Bloomfield Township Public Library. "We worked in groups to create the circular tiles," says Alena Khalid. "It was a long process. My favorite part was painting it because after it dried, it looked really cool."

Principal Nick Russo congratulated students on their work. "I am incredibly proud of students at Conant Elementary," says Russo. "I hear that this is the first piece created by children on display at the Bloomfield Township Public Library. That is pretty exciting!"

The project was funded by a BHS Foundation mini grant. Cathie Badalamenti, Foundation Director, says, "Art installation exemplifies the BHS Foundation's mission to partner with the community in supporting excellence in BHS."



## Astronaut Michael Massimino Presents to BHHS Students

Dr. Michael Massimino spoke at BHHS about what it was like to become a NASA astronaut and to take part in two space flights servicing the Hubble Space Telescope.

"I really liked hearing his journey on how he became an astronaut. It was incredibly inspirational," says Sarah Greig, BHHS student.

Massimino is a Mechanical Engineering Professor at Columbia University. He recently published an autobiography titled, "Spaceman: An Astronaut's Unlikely Journey to Unlock the Secrets of the Universe." The book details what it is like to "find yourself strapped to a giant rocket that's about to go from zero to 17,500 miles per hour." He has received the NASA Distinguished Service Medal, American Astronautical Society's Flight Achievement Award, and Star of the Italian Solidarity.



## 4th BHS Student in 24 Months to Earn a Perfect ACT Score

Emily Wang, BHHS student, just received word that she earned a perfect score on the ACT. She is the fourth Bloomfield Hills Schools student to earn a perfect ACT score in the past 24 months.

Previously, students Helena Gregg (15 years old), Simona Zhu (BHHS Sophomore), and Alan Zhang (13 years old), have earned perfect scores.

According to the ACT, less than one-tenth of one percent (less than .1%) of students who take the exam earns a 36 composite (perfect score), but in BHS, that number is more than three times higher (0.32%). What's the BHS secret for success?

“All of our staff, from the teachers to the bus drivers, encourage students to dream big and do their best,” Glass continues. “Whether our students dream of a perfect ACT score or being the next Olympic medalist, we’re here to help. With over 128 clubs and co-curriculars in addition to our course offerings, we have something for every interest.”

Helena Gregg, the first of the bunch to receive the perfect score says, “I am thankful to my teachers. They’re so supportive and the teaching in Bloomfield Hills Schools is amazing.” Gregg moved to the district in the 7th grade. “My parents wanted me to have the best and Bloomfield is the best,” she says. Just this year, the website Niche agreed, naming Bloomfield Hills Schools the number one school district in Michigan.

Alan Zhang, who was just 13 years old when he received his perfect score credits his counselors: “They helped guide me through the course selection process and through the various opportunities.” Students in BHS have a lot of choices, including studying in the largest outdoor classroom in Oakland County at the E.L. Johnson Nature Center, or visiting the 96-acre Bowers School Farm.

Emily Wang, the most recent to earn the perfect score, reflected on her time thus far in BHS: “Any teacher I’ve had who has been really passionate about their subject or who has really challenged me has been influential.” Simona Zhu, who received her perfect score in May of 2016 agrees: “My favorite teachers would have to be my 8th grade teachers Mr. and Mrs. Honeyman. They both were extremely passionate about teaching and made classes very entertaining.”



## **EHMS Student to Compete on Kids Baking Championship Show on Food Network**

“Baking is a family tradition. It has been passed down from generation to generation, from my great grandparents to me,” says Reese Smith, 5th grade student at East Hills Middle School. “I love experimenting with new recipes. The strawberry peppermint cake is my favorite.”

Smith has shown an interest in baking since a young age. “We can’t keep him out of the kitchen!” his mother Renea exclaims. “He practices at our family-owned bakery, Cake Crumbs. I am very proud of him.”

“I went to my mom’s bakery every day of the week during the summer,” says Smith. “I had her employees and of course my family, try my desserts. They really liked the s’mores éclairs.”

"Students shared their thinking, learning journey, and understanding of a variety of issues related to plant life," says Jamie Goldschmidt, Visible Thinking and Sustainability Coordinator.



In an effort to transparently address building concerns, collaboratively solve problems, and spot opportunities, the Bloomfield Hills Schools staff created a new program titled, Just the FACTS.

The FACTS team is comprised of the leaders from the following five content areas: Facilities (Brian Goby, Director of Physical Plant Services), Accounting (Tina Kostiuk, Assistant Superintendent of Business Services), Communications (Shira Good, Director of Communications), Technology (Dave Shulkin, Director of Information Services), and Security (Officer Cory Donberger, District Security).

As a team, the group visits each school and site, speaks candidly with school leaders and administrators about challenges, and determines ways central administration can provide better support. The team asks the question, "What's not working well?" then listens, gathers feedback, and formulates improvement plans.

"There's a lot of overlap in our content areas and often it takes all of us to work on something at different points along the way," says Dave Shulkin about the group structure and members. Tina Kostiuk adds, "While individual conversations are wonderful and there's certainly a time and place for them, these sessions give us an opportunity to get together and identify how we can work collaboratively to support each building and program."

"With the high school project and tight construction timeline, it was challenging to make it into the other schools on a consistent basis. These meetings give me the opportunity to reconnect with the buildings," says Brian Goby. Cory Donberger says, "I'm in the buildings regularly - supporting drills, spotting potential problems, and working with staff to keep students safe. But FACTS visits allow for a more in-depth look into issues we need to spend time talking about and working on."

"It's our hope to continue the Just the FACTS program, visiting each building and program at least once per semester. While it's a challenge to coordinate schedules, the meetings are time well spent and we're learning a lot. We find common threads and themes to discuss later as an administrative team," says Shira Good.

### See Winter-Resident Birds Up Close!

Winter Bird Banding is on Saturday, February 4, 2017 at 9:00 am. Allen Chartier, one of Michigan's premier birding experts, will capture, identify, measure, band, and release birds that visit the Nature Center bird feeders. This is a great opportunity to see common winter resident birds up-close.

Additionally, Nature Center Manager Dan Badgley, will share a popular winter bird banding essay written by noted naturalist and author Aldo Leopold, entitled 65290.

"Last year in May, 141 birds were caught and banded and new record was set for the number bird species observed - 93 different species!" says Badgley, "Birds indicate how healthy our environment is, so this is a good sign."

Bowers School Farm is now home to four bee hives for hands-on learning activities. "We recently received two new colonies from Tollgate Farms, and we were excited to raise two new queen bees," says T.J. Lang, Farm Guide. Students helped extract and bottle the honey. "We harvested just shy of 100 pounds of honey with our fourth graders this year," explains Lang. "We also incorporated a blind taste test, pitting our honey against exotic varietals to show the diversity of flavors and colors available." Students took the taste test data back to class to analyze.



Bowers Farm also incorporated bees in a number of programs for the BHS Robotics FIRST LEGO Leagues. Bees were one of the themes teams based their projects on this year. "Models and robots were built to represent a challenge bees face in their environment and animals they share their habitat with," says Lang.

"This new program compliments many other programs we run which teach food harvesting and processing," He adds.

## DISTRICT PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

Bloomfield Hills Schools implemented an “Integrated Pesticide Management” program (IPM) for the purpose of reducing or eliminating the use of herbicides or pesticides in District

buildings and sites.

There are times, however, that a pesticide or herbicide application is necessary. Prior to these times, unless an emergency occurs, you have the right to be notified of these applications. This notification is in compliance with State Regulation #637, revised effective Aug. 13, 1995. If you desire to be notified of scheduled applications during the school year, please contact your child’s building secretary and request your name be placed on the notification list. A list will be retained by school personnel to contact you regarding dates of any application that may occur when school is in session. During the summer of 2016, school break periods, and prior to the start of the 2016-

2017 school year, the grounds department will be applying weed-controlling herbicides to all sites. This letter is your notification of that application. Notification will also be posted at the main entrances of all buildings where applications occur.

## STORM WATER MANAGEMENT

Bloomfield Hills Schools has a comprehensive Storm Water Management Program as required by the Environmental Protection Agency. The program is designed to help the District improve the quality of the storm water discharged from District facilities. The written plan is available for review through the Physical Plant Services Office, 4220 Andover Road, Bloomfield Hills,
