

### High School Project & Programming

Learning Communities will allow for increased interdisciplinary connections, greater personalization, stronger relationships between staff and students, and an elevated community climate

Projected enrollment of 1,700

Bloomfield Hills High School will academically open in the fall of 2015 - some spaces (such as the auditorium and pool may not be open until second semester)

Millions are saved annually by operating one school building instead of three buildings

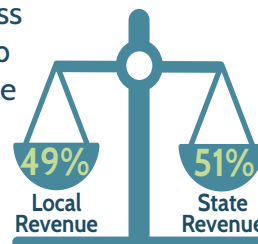


### Hold-Harmless & Non-Homestead Millage Renewal

The BHS millage renewal is not an increase - If approved, tax rates will remain the same



Together, the Hold-Harmless & Non-Homestead make up about 1/2 of the revenue the district receives per student (approx. \$32 million of the 2016 - 2017 budget)

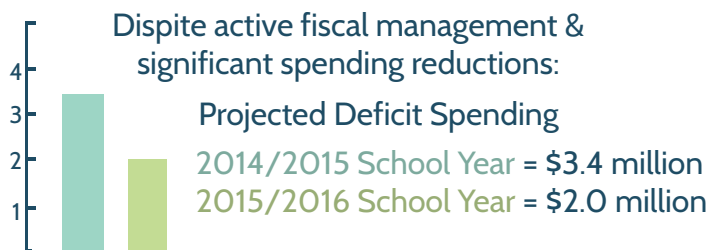


This is not a new tax. As required by law, voters must approve a renewal of the Hold-Harmless Millage every 10 years. This renewal is different from the state's proposal to support roads & schools.

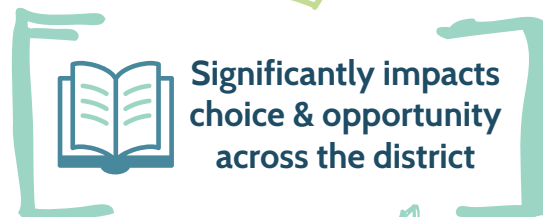


### Budget

Since 2008, state funding has dropped over \$500 per student
